GUIDE TO ACETATE COLOR COMMUNICATION

ULAM uses acetates (colored, plastic cards) placed over animal cage cards to communicate information between laboratory and ULAM personnel.

Five different acetate colors are used – red, blue, yellow, green, and clear.

An acetate can mean different things depending on its color and orientation (e.g., horizontal or vertically placed over the cage card).

The table below describes what each acetate color and orientation means. Learn more at animalcare.umich.edu/acetates

Horizontal Red	Health concern or abnormality noted and veterinary personnel notified
Vertical Red	Veterinary personnel have examined animal and short-term follow-up is needed
Horizontal Blue	Overcrowded cage densities, requiring attention by the next business day
Vertical Blue	ULAM identifying single housed animal lacking blue tab with date and code
Horizontal Yellow	Deviation from ULAM Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs)
Horizontal Green	Veterinary personnel providing long-term monitoring or treatment of condition noted
Horizontal Clear	Condition observed, noted, and no monitoring or treatment is needed
